As the job had to be completed that day so we could run over that section of the line next day, they got very wet – a free shower!!

We recently had a scrap truck visit us & took away a large load of scrap & old rails.

Old hall: This is now a heap of broken timber. It was demolished largely by Dave M & Ian J using our new digger. The timber has been sorted & any salvageable timber has been saved. The rest is being cut up for firewood. Those who have helped with the cutting up are Dave M, Ian J, Bob B & Trev W. Ian J has taken 5 trailer loads of rubbish to the dump.

WOODWORK SHOP LEAN-TO

Ian J has drilled into the concrete floor & put in the starter rods for the concrete blocks that will form the lower part of the rear wall.

He has also started laying some of the blocks.

Bruce McL & Pete C recently re-routed the downpipe on the rear wall so it is now above the roof line of the lean to. Bruce brought a trailer load of scaffolding to do the job. After the downpipe was re-routed, the timber that he roof will rest on was attached to the rear wall of the shed by Bruce McL & Richard S.

N.Z.T.A.

We have received their final report after their assessment of BTC during our December open day.

They have made 4 x non compliances & 3 x recommendations. One of the recommendations is that safety critical operating members will require medical certificates. The committee are presently working on the type of med cert that we will require & the age it will apply from. Be warned!! We will require med certs at some future date.

LOCOMOTIVES

Peckett: This loco has the boiler opened up for its annual inspection. The work was done by Chris M, Dave M & John S.

Climax 1650: After approx. 10 years work overhauling the boiler, it left the Junction recently to be reunited with the rest of the loco in Te Kuiti.

Tr105: Number plates have been cast in brass for this locomotive. The airbrake system upgrade for operating the train brakes remains on hold due to Covid.

Heisler: Both wooden headstocks have been removed by Richard S. Both will need replacing. They were from an oak tree in the Papakura – Drury area & were obtained by the late John Hunter about 50 years ago, while the loco was still at MOTAT.

Donations towards the overhaul of this loco are still coming in slowly.

Dave M has been needle gunning the underframe ready for painting.

Diesel loco 402: For some time we have had a community worker at the Junction who comes out every week. He worked on Tr 105 & is now working on 402. He is making up air pipework so the loco can supply air for the carriage brakes, the same as 401. He has largely completed the job & another few weeks should see the job complete except for the fitting of a pressure reducing valve.

ROLLING STOCK

CJ has started the annual inspections of our rolling stock. Bruce has recommenced the restoration of the Xp wagon.
